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SUMMARY & BACKGROUND

On March 11, 2021, the President signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARP). ARP makes available \$122.8 billion nationally in a third round of Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds. New York State has been allocated nearly \$9 billion under the ARP Act's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund. The ARP Act requires that a minimum of \$8.09 billion (90 percent) be allocated to LEAs, including charter schools and Special Act School Districts that are LEAs. Pursuant to the terms of the ARP Act, LEA allocations have been calculated using the relative shares of grants awarded under Title I, Part A of the ESEA for the most recent federal fiscal year (2020). Each eligible LEA's ARP-ESSER allocation may be found [HERE](#).

Under section 2001(d)(2) of ARP Act of 2021, each State Educational Agency (SEA) must make ARP-ESSER allocations to LEAs in an expedited and timely manner and, to the extent practicable, not later than 60 days after the SEA receives its ARP-ESSER funds. The first portion of ARP-ESSER Funds was awarded to states on March 24, 2021, and 60 days from that day is May 24, 2021. The U.S. Department of Education (USDE) has taken the position that an SEA makes allocations when it authorizes the LEA to begin to obligate funds in accordance with its needs. To enable New York State's LEAs to begin to obligate ARP-ESSER funds by USDE's May 24, 2021 deadline, the application for LEA 90% base ARP-ESSER allocations is being administered by NYSED as a two-part application process:

ARP-ESSER Application – Part 1: The first step was for each LEA to submit signed assurances to NYSED by May 24, 2021. Upon receipt of signed LEA assurances, NYSED provided an email notice to the LEA of substantially approvable application status. Upon receipt of such notice, LEAs were able to begin obligating their allocation of 90% base ARP-ESSER funds.

ARP-ESSER Application – Part 2: The second step will be the submission of a full application and budget by the LEA. NYSED will issue a Grant Award Notice (GAN) to the LEA after the LEA's application is fully reviewed and approved by NYSED. Part 2 will address several of the plan-related assurances an LEA must provide in Part 1 of the application process.

The ARP Act requires LEAs to reserve at least 20% of their 90% ARP-ESSER allocation to address learning loss through the implementation of evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning or summer enrichment, extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs, or extended school year programs, and ensure that such interventions respond to students' academic, social, and emotional needs and address the disproportionate impact of the coronavirus on economically disadvantaged students, children with disabilities, English learners, racial and ethnic minorities, migrant students, students experiencing homelessness, and children and youth in foster care. 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Title VIII of Division B of the CARES Act directs the Department to carry out the Education Stabilization Fund, of which the ARP ESSER funds are a part. Section 2001 of the ARP Act provides for the Department to make grants to each SEA from the ARP ESSER funds. The LEA engaged a diverse and representative set of applicable stakeholders in developing our plan to use these funds. Our work included Board of Education meeting discussions, faculty meeting discussion, and a parent survey that was participated in. Committee members included: 2 board members, school treasurer, school principal, finance office clerk. There was a survey that permitted the community at large, including teachers and staff, to give input on items that will assist Margaretville in closing the gap.

To continue including stakeholders in the process of implementing programs related to projected expenditures, we will use our school website, quarterly newsletter, social media and school board meetings to give progress reports and to ask for continued input. We are also forming a parent committee whose purpose will be to provide input from the school's families to continue to improve the program implementation as the monies are spent and work continues. Finally, these monies will be interpolated into the district's strategic plan so that our efforts at continuous improvement include new work resulting from these revenues.

- 3. In the space provided below, please describe the extent to which and how the funds will be used to implement prevention and mitigation strategies that are, to the greatest extent practicable, consistent with the most recent CDC guidance on reopening schools, in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning.**

Our school is following the CDC guidelines. We will be masked, socially distanced, and continuing to monitor temperatures. The school has used ESSER funds to purchase sanitizing equipment, masks and cleansing/hand sanitizing products to ensure that students, faculty/staff and family members have the highest degree of safety possible. We are not specifically designating these funds to this part of COVID relief because it has been covered via other grants and our supplies are currently sufficient. Despite this fact, we are addressing the gaps created by COVID19 by increasing our education and applying the restrictions indicated by the DOH.

With regard to mitigation, a significant portion of the funding is being used to address mental health concerns within our district. Currently we have identified 30 families who need mental health services as a result of Covid or the Covid closure. We believe that this work is critical to preventing further damage and increased learning/SEL gaps. This will be the best way to decrease the damage caused by COVID 19.

We will continue to use classroom formative assessments, summative assessments, benchmarking and State assessments. In addition, we will be using parent input regarding the effectiveness of our interventions.

We will use three surveys: School Performance Scan (SPS), Family Engagement Scan (FES) and the Student Voice (SV) to track 6 domains as indicated in the DTSDE framework. These scans, performed annually, will give us a 360 degree input of data about the sense of satisfaction and safety on the part of all stakeholders. Also, we will use disciplinary referral data and attendance data to monitor how well we are able to curb the spread of COVID19 in our school community. Furthermore, this data will also show us whether students are responding to our program implementation in using the ARP funds.

Specifically, we are hoping to address the learning gaps, SEL gaps and provide support to "re-engage" our students with school. These interventions are designed to enhance engagement as well as address emotional stressors that occurred as a result of the Covid closures and prolonged hybrid instruction model.

We will be offering summer learning and enrichment to compliment our current summer program. In addition, we will support our afterschool programs.

The 20% will be specifically utilized by the following programs:

1. Summer Enrichment Program (\$9,800)
2. ELL After School Satellite Program (\$9,000)
3. Mental Health Services (\$138,000)
4. Administrator for the ARP grant implementation (\$33,000)

Those funds are being spent on professional salaries to support learning loss and impact of our elementary program by hiring educators to support our children and those in poverty.

1. Technology/Digital media teacher to impact College and Career Readiness. (CCR)
2. Administrator to implement programs and continue insuring the appropriate expenditure of funds.
3. Teachers will be learning about AP courses and begin delivering these in the context of the school schedule.
4. Ss will tour regional colleges to be apprised of requirements and understand that gaps in learning do not change expectations. (CCR)
5. Mental Health Services
6. Speech Therapist to assist the current speech therapist in delivering increased need for services.
7. Summer enrichment
8. ELL Satellite

The interventions implemented will be monitored by our building administrator and our CSE chairperson. In addition, the quarterly benchmarking assessments will be reviewed and shared during regular faculty meetings.

We are especially interested in addressing the following areas:

1. All ss college and career readiness. Beginning in UPK - HS, students need to be exposed to high expectations, enrichment opportunities (Summer Enrichment) and appropriate services (i.e. Speech) to be ready for post secondary life. Many of our students' educations were delayed or really put in reverse and we are creating programs to address these gaps. This will be accessible to Gen Education, ELL, SWD, Low SES, Foster and racially diverse students. We have four foster students two of whom are African-American.
2. ELLs comprise 1/10th of our population. The ELL satellite will allow students to have homework support with a native speaking teacher two evenings per week. This program targets our ELL students, but also addresses families who cannot afford tutoring services or other supports to enhance access to the school curriculum.
3. Our school lacks a true technology program. Hiring a teacher who can apply 21st century programs to our school will assist us in updating our students' needs. While all student populations will benefit, this level of preparation will be of interest for SWDs, Low SES, ELL, and our White population.
4. Our students lost access to mental health services when the hospital changed to focus of its grant to another area. We had 50 families utilizing two LSWs regularly. We are hoping these funds will help us reinstate the critical mental health services our students require. This should address the needs of many of our populations but particularly: SWDs (OHI), Students in the foster system, Low SES students will certainly be impacted by having access to this resource.
5. The administrator will assist the district in communicating the changes and ongoing work related to the ARP grant so that all stakeholders can be aware of the progress being made to overcome the COVID19 gaps.

The plan for in-person instruction will be discussed at our regularly scheduled Board of Education meetings. In addition, a letter will be mailed out to our parents indicating parent input is welcomed. In addition, we will put out a survey for parents to fill in for additional input. We first posted our plan in July, 2020. Since then, we have reviewed the plan semi-annually with our board of education and annually (in July) with a multi-stakeholder group comprised of staff, teachers, administrators, students and parents. Board meetings will be at the reorganizational meetings annually in July and again at the January Board meeting. Any changes to the plan are updated after these meetings. The annual multi stakeholder meeting takes place at the end of July - in week four. This year it took place on July 27th. In 2020, it took place on July 25th. Furthermore, we utilize a district wide survey to sort and implement information provided by the community at large and this is considered and changed into actions when possible, during the annual July stakeholder meeting.

The reopening plan is reviewed annually, during the summer as described above. If revisions are required, because NYSED or because our department of health guidelines indicate change is necessary, we make appropriate revisions in team meetings. Multistakeholder group meetings in the summer (described above), provide us with the feedback that is incorporated into the document, assuming that it is not contradictory to government requirements. The team meetings are comprised superintendent, principal, assist principal, CSE chair, parent representative, teacher and staff representatives).
